When I applied to the Michigan State University Master's of Arts in Education program in April of 2010 I had just finished my first year teaching. I had a tough first year teaching and decided to move back home with my family in Michigan after a year living on my own in Colorado. I was not confident that I would be able to find a job back in Michigan so I thought it would be a great time to finish my masters. I was fortunate to land a job and started a journey of teaching and learning full time. More than two years later I have finished two more years teaching at different schools and different grades.
